

Commercial Art

The Commercial Art course reflects the ever-growing demand for attractive commercial and meaningful ways of communicating with the public, and for this reason consists of many kinds of art, including lettering, fashion illustration, photography and general art. The first three are self-explanatory while the latter, general art, is the class in which all types of commercial artwork are learned: layout, pasteup, watercolor, oil painting, silkscreen, and many others.

Auto Mechanics and Aviation

In Auto Mechanics, a boy has the opportunity to learn every aspect of repairing and maintenance of an automobile. All during the three years of this course, he has shop classes for three hours in which he works on customers' cars.

After he graduates, the student has many opportunities for a job in any branch of the auto industry.

Aviation Mechanics is also a three year course which covers both theory and shop practice. Students work on units for both small and large aircraft. This year, with the added equipment, the FAA (Federal Aeronautics Administration) has approved our course, making it possible for graduates to obtain licenses to practice which will give them better job opportunities.

Business Department

Efficiency, the key to running any office, is stressed in each one of the three business courses offered at Vocational.

The Calculating Machines department offers training in operating the machines with speed and accuracy. Along with this class, typing, bookkeeping, office training, and business machines are required.

The Stenography department stresses shorthand and English above all other subjects. Also included in the course is training in the use of dictating machines, book-keeping, typing, office training, filing, and business machines.

General Business is a generalized course not specializing in any one subject. The student acquires an over-all knowledge of all business techniques.

Cabinet and Pattern Making, Upholstering

Cabinet Making is an advanced course in woodworking. The student learns how to use all hand tools and power machines in making cabinets, chairs, tables, and other household and business furnishings.

Pattern Making, a branch of the metal casting field, is a skill that enables boys to make patterns used for models in production of most metal objects. A patternmaker must thoroughly understand machine drafting, blueprint reading, and foundry molding processes. He also has to be an expert in the use and the care of all woodworking hand and machine tools.

Upholstering gives the student a basic background in the repairing and building of different kinds of furniture. During the course, he learns the methods of springing, and seat, arm, and back construction.

Cosmetology and Barbering

Cosmetology today offers a challenge to those students who have a specific talent. Not all students qualify, however, for many special traits are necessary of which a pleasing personality and a willingness to get along with the public are among the most important. The required 1500 hours of training and the written examination at the end of the term provide the student with her license to practice in various fields.

Boys who are interested in *barbering* will find that this course-is an excellent one to take. Under the direction of an experienced instructor, the student, after completing his 1200 hour course, is eligible to take his examination to receive his license.

Machine and Architectural Drafting

In Architectural Drafting, a boy learns to draw plans, or "working drawings," of a complete building or parts of a building. A senior is able to estimate the cost of a building and make pictorial drawings of the finished structure to be shown to the owner of a building.

Machine Drafting is similar except that in this course a student learns to draw and design various machine parts. In his sophomore year, he learns to draw parts by copying various existing parts; then in his junior and senior years he learns to plan and design various machine parts of his own.

Machine Shop, Sheet Metal and Welding

The expansion of industry has brought about an ever-increasing demand for workers in these trades.

The *machinist* is taught the essential skills of hand-tool operations and machine operations. He is trained in the forming of steel and other materials into various shapes and sizes to conform to blueprint specifications.

The *sheet metal* student is instructed in the drafting or layout and fabrication of sheet metal products. The course includes general sheet metal and the installation of pipes and ducts for heating, ventilation and air-conditioning needed for building construction.

Students in welding learn to operate various kinds of welding equipment suited for different jobs. They also are trained to recognize individual metals, the correct way to weld them, and how to read blueprints.

Needle Arts, Tailoring and Retail Sales

Most of us think that the designing and sewing of beautiful dresses- and other clothing takes little effort and thought, but students in the Needle Arts and Tailoring departments know that this isn't true. A garment with good lines takes planning and replanning to achieve a striking effect.

A student must be able to recognize texture and wearability of materials, learn to design patterns, and cut and sew articles either by hand or by power-sewing machine.

A person who likes to meet people especially enjoys the *Retail Training* course. A student here learns the techniques of selling, keeping sales records, and of designing and setting up displays. These future sales people can practice their salesmanship on customers in the school store.

Pre-Nursing Department

From the time they were toddlers, many girls have dreamed of becoming nurses. If such a girl is accepted for enrollment in the *Pre-Nursing Department*, she may find out in actual nurse-aide training whether she is adapted for work in the nursing field, or for further training in professional nursing.

During a girl's three years of study here she obtains a basic knowledge in nurse-aid trainnig. In her sophomore and junior years she learns the fundamentals of her profession—care of patients, the arranging of meals, and the care of children in the nursery school. In her Senior and the last part of her junior year, a girl who is able to qualify can actually put into practice the training that she has received at Swedish hospital working as a nurses' aid.

Printing

Printing, being one of the nation's ten largest industries, has become a popular as well as important course here at Vocational. Part of its importance lies in the fact that all printing for the Minneapolis Public Schools is done in our print shop.

The sophomore begins his course with classes in bookbinding and letterpress work; the junior then learns to print in offset and to work in the job shop; the senior may either continue his job shop work or work with a commercial print shop for additional training and experience.






Letterman's Club

Under the direction of Mr. Schow, the Letterman's Club sponsors one all-school dance during the school year. This year the well-attended dance was held in March.










Bryce Mason, Number 2, heads for a goal in the Henry game while Jeff Ostrowski guards against Henry's interference.


